REGISTRATION FEES

Registration fees are due at the time of registration. Students are not enrolled until all registration fees are paid. Registration fees, supplies fees, technology fees, insurance fees, and book fees, if required, are listed with each course listing.

ELIGIBILITY

Admission is open to adults who are at least 18 years old and who are not enrolled in public school. 16-18 year olds may enroll in some courses. Students under 18 years of age may enroll in summer classes specifically for the younger student. Only individuals who have registered and paid may attend class.

REFUND POLICY

Registration fee refunds are granted only under the following circumstances:

- A student who officially withdraws from an extension class(es) prior to the first class meeting shall be eligible for a 100 percent refund. Also, a student is eligible for a 100-percent refund if an applicable class is canceled.
- After the respective class begins a 75-percent refund shall be made upon the request of the student if the student officially withdraws from the class prior to or on the 10-percent point of the scheduled hours of the class. Note: This rule is applicable regardless of the number of times the class meets or the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet.
- A 100-percent refund shall be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class prior to the first day of class of the academic semester or term or if the college cancels the class. A 75-percent refund shall be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class on or before the tenth calendar day of the class
- Self-supporting classes are not eligible for refunds.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT

For occupational extension classes, Continuing Education Units (CEUs) are allowed. One CEU may be given for each 10 contact hours of participation in class.

Fundraiser to support student scholarships



Over 4 years, annual SCC gala raises more than \$250,000.

Since moving its annual gala to Harrah's Cherokee Casino Resort in 2015, the SCC Foundation has raised more than a quarter-of-a-million dollars.

As has been the case annually since its inception, the current year's gala yielded more money than the last. "Bluegrass, Blue Jeans & Bling," which was held on Aug. 25, netted more than \$72,000 when factoring in table sponsorships, silent auction sales, wine pull proceeds and individual tickets. All money raised goes toward supporting SCC students through scholarships.

"None of our success with the gala would be possible without the generosity and support from our good friends at Harrah's," said Dr. DonTomas, SCC President. "We are incredibly blessed to live in a region filled with kind and generous people who understand how Southwestern benefits our communities, and they're always willing to step up with amazing levels of financial support. We cannot thank all our sponsors and donors enough.

"We also could not have done this without the help of all our volunteers," Dr. Tomas added. "Our co-chairs, Wendy LeMay and Lambert Wilson, once again did an amazing job of coordinating this gala. It takes a tremendous amount of work to make these events successful, and I deeply appreciate all the hard work that's done behind the scenes."

At this year's gala, attendees heard from scholarship recipients MaShon Gaddis and Yesenia Navarro. Gaddis is a current student while Navarro graduated in May. Each spoke briefly about how significant an impact their scholarships have made on their lives.

Thanks in part to the recent successful galas, the Foundation is experiencing unprecedented growth – and is

able to help more students each year. However, there is still much work to do. The Foundation's assets have more than doubled since Dr. Tomas became president in 2011 and currently stand at \$5,555,028.11.


During the 2017 gala, SCC celebrated the completion of its first million-dollar endowment. And as the Foundation continues to gather fundraising momentum, the college is able to support more students than ever.

There's **nothing** fun about getting a minor traffic citation or ticket.

The good news is that Southwestern Community College can help take away some of the sting.

"Our classes are short, informative and actually help you get something positive out of an otherwise unpleasant situation," said Scott Sutton, SCC's Dean of Workforce Continuing Education.

Drivers will need to check with the Assistant District Attorney to ask if they're eligible and to receive permission slips to take the class. Participants who complete the course will receive official forms to submit to the court.

SCC now offers three options: the traditional four-hour defensive driving program, an eight-hour "Attitudinal Dynamics of Driving" class for repeat offenders and a four-hour course entitled "Alive at 25" specially designed for younger drivers.

"We are grateful to the Safety & Health Council of North Carolina and to the District Attorney's office for their cooperation in making it possible to offer this opportunity to area residents," Sutton said. "We all benefit from having safer behaviors on the road, and these classes are proven to save lives and help folks make better driving decisions."

Dates, times and costs for the safe driving classes vary.

WORKFORCE EDUCATION

SEF-3001- Defensive Driving Course: (4 Hrs.) This course will motivate drivers to change their behind-the-wheel behaviors and attitudes. 

Law Enforcement First Response Tactical Casualty Care: LEFR-TCC teaches public safety first responders including police, other law enforcement officers, firefighters, and other first responders the basic medical care interventions that will help save an injured responder's life until EMS practitioners can safely enter a tactical scene. It combines the principles of PHTLS and TCCC, and meets the recommendations of the Hartford Consensus document and TECC guidelines. Call for more information.

Tactical Emergency Casualty Care (TECC) Course: In response to the increased need for tactical trauma care education, the PHTLS Committee is pleased to announce that the Tactical Emergency Casualty Care (TECC) curriculum is now available. This new 16 hour course is designed for EMS practitioners needing tactical casualty care training for the civilian sector and meets all Tactical Emergency Casualty Care guidelines. Call for more information.

Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT): The primary focus of this course is to provide basic and limited advanced emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients who access the emergency medical system. This individual possesses the basic knowledge and skills necessary to provide patient care and transportation. The Advanced Emergency Medical Technician is a link from the scene to the emergency health care system.

Pre-Hospital Trauma Life Support (PHTLS): PHTLS is developed by the National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians in cooperation with the American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma. The Pre hospital Trauma Life Support PHTLS) course is a unique continuing education program created in recognition of the real need in EMS education for additional training in the handling of trauma patients. This indispensable program is designed to enhance and increase knowledge and skill in delivering critical care in the prehospital environment. Call for more information.

Advanced Medical Life Support: NAEMT's Advanced Medical Life Support (AMLS) course is the first EMS education program that fully addresses how to best assess and manage the most common medical crises in patients, offering a "think outside the box" methodology. It is for all levels of practitioners with a strong commitment to patient care, including emergency medical technicians, paramedics, nurses, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurse anesthetists and physicians. The course emphasizes the use of scene sizeup, history, interactive group discussion on potential treatment strategies, and physical exam to systematically rule out and consider possibilities and probabilities in treating patients' medical crises. The course offers an initial assessment-based approach that progresses to a diagnostic-based approach to quickly develop the best treatment plan. Call for more information.

Emergency Medical Responder: The primary focus of the Emergency Medical Responder is to initiate immediate lifesaving care to critical patients who access the emergency medical system. This individual possesses the basic knowledge and skills necessary to provide lifesaving interventions while awaiting additional EMS response and to assist higher level personnel at the scene and during transport. Emergency Medical Responders function as part of a comprehensive EMS response, under medical oversight. Emergency Medical Responders perform basic interventions with minimal equipment. The class consists of 72 hours didactic and hands-on patient scenario training. Call for more information.

Pediatric Critical Care: (24 hrs.) This course covers pediatric renal failure, status epilepticus in pediatrics, pediatric burn patient, pediatric stroke patient, etc. Call for more information.


