A SMOOTHER TRANSITION TO ATTEND WCU

New admission agreement smooths transition for SCC graduates to attend WCU

Leaders of **Western Carolina University** and **Southwestern Community College** met Tuesday, Oct. 1, to sign a memorandum of understanding that guarantees admission to WCU for all SCC graduates who satisfy criteria spelled out in the document.

With a flourish of pen strokes, WCU Chancellor Dr. Kelli R. Brown and SCC President Dr. Don Tomas established the **Catamount Compass Program** during a signing ceremony in the board room of H.F. Robinson Administration Building on the WCU campus.

The direct-entry admission program builds upon the existing North Carolina Comprehensive Articulation Agreement that governs the transfer of credits between the North Carolina Community College System and the University of North Carolina System.

The agreement follows a gathering earlier this year of six community college leaders at WCU to discuss ways that two- and four-year institutions can work better together to provide a more seamless transition for students seeking additional higher education opportunities.

“We want to make the process of transferring to Western Carolina University as smooth as possible for the graduates of all our community college partners across the region and the state,” Dr. Brown said. “This new memorandum of understanding is an important tool in providing well-defined directions for SCC graduates who are looking to further their education just down the road at Western.”

The agreement also represents the latest step in a history of collaboration between the university and SCC, which was the second-largest feeder institution for students transferring to WCU for the fall 2019 semester. Of the 818

students who transferred to WCU this fall from community colleges, 105 of them – or **12.8 percent** – came from Southwestern Community College.

“We’re proud to build on our strong and longstanding relationship with our educational partners at Western Carolina University,” said Dr. Tomas. “Our Jackson Campus is a five-minute drive from Cullowhee, and the vast majority of our college transfer graduates go directly to WCU. We’re all here today to serve our students, and I’m gratified that this agreement will contribute to their success. I want to thank our friends at Western and my colleagues at SCC who’ve worked together to make this agreement possible.”

The onset of the NC Promise tuition plan, which reduces the cost of in-state tuition to \$500 per semester at WCU and two other UNC System institutions, has resulted in a significant increase in the number of students transferring to WCU from community colleges and other four-year schools.

The WCU-SCC memorandum of understanding follows a similar agreement between Western and Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College in July. Additional agreements with other community colleges are in the works, said Phil Cauley, assistant vice chancellor for undergraduate enrollment.



To participate in the Catamount Compass Program, students must meet several conditions, including:

- Be a currently enrolled student at SCC in a degree-seeking capacity.
- Submit WCU application for admission and records by the university deadline.
- Submit application fee or waiver and fulfill all commitment action steps.
- Be in good standing at SCC and other institutions attended.
- Demonstrate good citizenship and conduct.
- Earn and maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.50 at SCC and a minimum GPA of 2.20 in the most recently completed academic term.
- Earn an associate degree from SCC in a college transfer program or in an applied program for which an articulation agreement exists.
- Enroll at WCU within one academic year (within the next two regular terms or fall/spring semesters) of completion of the associate degree.

* Although the Catamount Compass Program does guarantee admission to WCU for those SCC graduates who meet the requirements, it does not guarantee admission into a specific degree program. Some programs of study at WCU have their own programmatic admission criteria, standards, policies, processes and deadlines.

Celebrating another record-breaking gala!

Since moving its annual gala to Harrah's Cherokee Casino Resort in 2015, the Southwestern Community College Foundation is celebrating its fifth record-breaking year for money raised toward student scholarships.

Factoring in table sponsorships, silent auction sales, wine pull proceeds and individual ticket sales, the SCC Foundation has now raised more than **\$350,000** since the event's inception.

"We are extremely grateful to our good friends at Harrah's for opening their doors and helping SCC usher in a new era of success in raising scholarship funding for our students," said Dr. Don Tomas, SCC President. "It's been exciting to see our annual gala grow each year, and we realize none of this would be possible without the generous spirit of so many good people in our service area. I want to personally thank every single one of our sponsors and donors."

"Dozens of individuals work tirelessly behind the scenes every year to make our gala a truly memorable experience," Dr. Tomas added. "Our co-chairs, Wendy LeMay and Lambert Wilson, pour their hearts into the planning process – as does everyone on our planning committee."

For the sixth-annual event, SCC's gala planning committee chose to alter the theme, update the overall look and book a new band. The result: **Boots, Blue Jeans and Bling** enjoyed a record number of attendees and a 50 percent increase in table sponsors from 2018 – leading to a total of \$86,160 in funds raised.

In addition to that total, an anonymous donor pledged another \$10,000 to the SCC Foundation during the gala.

And Dr. Jo Ray, Vice President of Community Relations and Employee Wellness for Harrah's Cherokee Casino Resort, announced that Harrah's is endowing a scholarship at SCC.

"We at Harrah's Cherokee are honored to continue our partnership with SCC," Dr. Ray said. "Supporting

education through an endowed scholarship that will support one of our employee's children upholds our Code of Commitment to make our communities better places to live and work."

This year, attendees heard from scholarship recipients Dolores Taylor and Megan Beck. Taylor is a recent graduate of SCC's Human Services Technology program while Beck is currently enrolled in SCC's Radiography program.

Thanks in part to the recent successful galas, the Foundation is experiencing unprecedented growth – and is able to help more students each year. However, there is still much work to do.

With the addition of a new Health Sciences Building, expected in 2021, SCC will be adding three more programs. With the anticipated increase in students, scholarship support will be more crucial than ever.

"We are thrilled with the outpouring of support for our students," said Wilson. "We still have more need than funds, so please continue to participate each year."

Total amount of scholarships awarded in 2013-14 was \$51,355. This year's scholarship value was \$167,000 – and that's in addition to the more than \$36,000 that was awarded to New Century Scholars. In 2018-19, the Foundation was also able to provide \$3,000 to students in need through the Student Emergency Fund.

"The most important message from this year's gala is that our momentum is continuing to grow," said Brett Woods, Director of the SCC Foundation. "Our goal is to continue building on this momentum until we're able to provide financial assistance to every student who can use a hand up."

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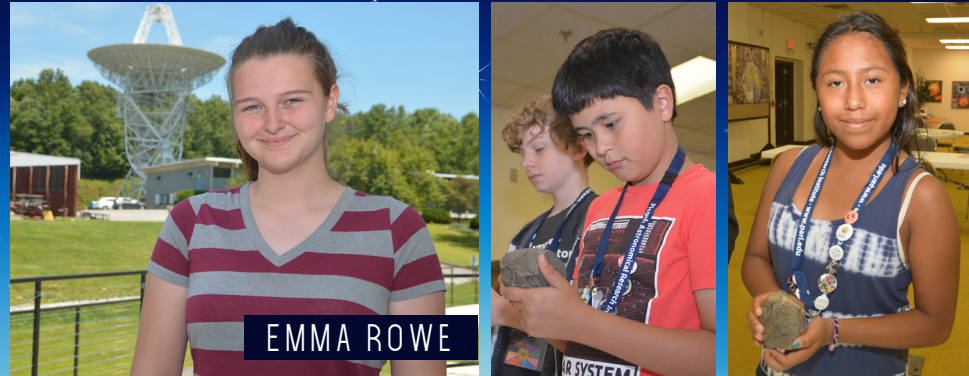

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SUMMER CAMPS

SCC PARTNERS WITH LCAP FOR SUMMER CAMPS

There's no straight or quick route for getting to the Learning Center at Pisgah Astronomical Research Institute (LCAP), located deep in the wooded mountains of Transylvania County.

But once you finally arrive at the historic campus dotted with enormous radio telescopes, the beauty of being so far away from civilization is revealed – particularly after the sun goes down.

A group of middle-school campers from throughout Western North Carolina observed this truth in early August when they walked over to LCAP's sky deck and took in a view of the heavens, unobscured by light pollution of any kind.

"Oh it's amazing," said Emma Rowe, a rising eighth grader at Scotts Creek Elementary. "The sky deck is my favorite part of LCAP's campus. Once your eyes adjust, you can see so clearly. On the hike up, you can see Jupiter in the sky, just the color of it. It's just so much more clear there. And they have huge telescopes, so you can see Saturn and Jupiter very clearly."

Rowe was part of the last group of youngsters to spend a week this summer at LCAP's Astro Explorers camp, which is made available to many students by Southwestern Community College and its partners through the Smoky Mountains STEM Collaborative.

SCC is the only community college in the nation to have a cooperative science agreement with NASA. Other partners in the Smoky Mountains STEM Collaborative include Appalachian State University, the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, NASA Marshall Space Flight Center and the public schools in Jackson, Macon and Swain Counties as well as Cherokee Central Schools.

"Our main goal with the collaborative is to enrich STEM education throughout our communities, with a special emphasis on K-12 education," said Matt Cass, a Physics and Astronomy Instructor at SCC. "This camp is a perfect fit because students get to experience science and astronomy up close and personal. What a treat it is to spend some time at a facility that was an essential part of the Apollo missions!"

Among other activities, campers got to learn about and hold meteorites, take hikes around LCAP's campus and become familiar with graphing, longitude and latitude.

For Karena Cline, a rising seventh grader at Swain Middle School, the best part was working with 3-D printers.

"We got to make our own designs," Cline said. "And we worked with a partner to create a crater or a volcano that's on the moon, and we got to 3-D print them."

Rowe also enjoyed the 3-D printer.

"I learned this time that I can produce cool things like braille and stuff," said Rowe, who had originally learned about 3-D printing on a previous trip to LCAP's campus. "I can also map different worlds."

Twenty-four middle-schoolers attended the early August camp, according to Nonnie Cullipher. She's the Learning Manager for the Learning Center at LCAP.

"The purpose of the camp is to learn how to design and build 3-D models of lunar and Martian landscapes," Cullipher said. "They also learn a lot about geography, and they're learning different ways of seeing. We had a very cool session using glasses to simulate visual impairments, and that's when we introduce braille, which campers created using the 3-D printers."

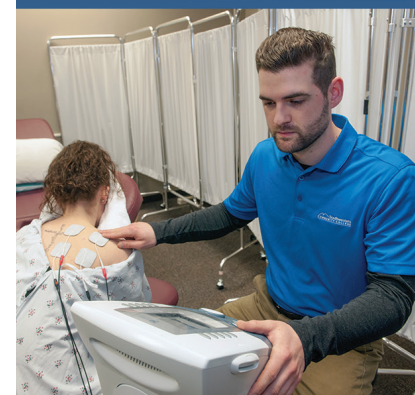
