REGISTRATION FEES

Registration fees are due at the time of registration. Students are not enrolled until all registration fees are paid. Registration fees, supplies fees, technology fees, insurance fees, and book fees, if required, are listed with each course listing.

ELIGIBILITY

Admission is open to adults who are at least 18 years old and who are not enrolled in public school. 16-18 year olds may enroll in some courses. Students under 18 years of age may enroll in summer classes specifically for the younger student. Only individuals who have registered and paid may attend class.

REFUND POLICY

Registration fee refunds are granted only under the following circumstances:

- A student who officially withdraws from an extension class(es) prior to the first class meeting shall be eligible for a 100 percent refund. Also, a student is eligible for a 100-percent refund if an applicable class is canceled.
- After the respective class begins a 75-percent refund shall be made upon the request of the student if the student officially withdraws from the class prior to or on the 10-percent point of the scheduled hours of the class. Note: This rule is applicable regardless of the number of times the class meets or the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet.
- A 100-percent refund shall be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class prior to the first day of class of the academic semester or term or if the college cancels the class. A 75-percent refund shall be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class on or before the tenth calendar day of the class.
- Self-supporting classes are not eligible for refunds.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT

For occupational extension classes, Continuing Education Units (CEUs) are allowed. One CEU may be given for each 10 contact hours of participation in class.

changes trajectory of five lives

For the Crutchfield family, Project SEARCH® has been the answer to a mother's heartfelt prayer.

Christopher Crutchfield, who is 28 and has Downs' Syndrome, had been staying at home the past few years – and his mother Janice wanted him to have a more productive pathway for his life. That's what Southwestern Community College's Project SEARCH® program provided.

"We felt like he needed something, but we didn't really know exactly where to go." Janice Crutchfield recalled back in mid-May. "So we prayed that God would send him something. And Marzena Bradley (part-time instructor at Southwestern Community College) approached me and told me about Project SEARCH®.'

So the younger Crutchfield, a Cherokee resident, enrolled in the program in August and spent the next nine months with four classmates taking classes and working internships through the program that's coordinated and run by Southwestern Community College.

Western Carolina University hosted Project SEARCH® this past year, and the interns worked in a variety of departments there including the print shop, warehouse, bookstore, First Stop, Rec Center, Homebase and more.

On graduation day, Janice Crutchfield watched as a capacity crowd filled the Homebase auditorium and celebrated the accomplishments of Christopher Crutchfield and his four fellow graduates: Dalton Hendricks of Bryson City, Breanna Varner of Franklin, Brittany Watson of Franklin and Michelle Mauldin of Cullowhee.

"Christopher is so much more independent; he fills his day more." Janice Crutchfield said. "He's capable of doing so many things.'

Project SEARCH® is a national nonprofit program that partners with businesses to create internships for voung adults with disabilities.

The program allows men and women from ages 18-30 with disabilities to gain marketable and transferrable employability skills through the implementation of hands-on work experience during a series of three separate, 10-week internships matched to their individual interests, strengths and abilities.

"For most of these graduates lives, people may have focused too much on what they cannot do," said Devonne Jimison, who oversee's the Project SEARCH® program at SCC. "We focus on what they can do. This is our fourth class of graduates. Every single year, our students exceed our expectations through this program. I could not be more proud of them, and I know every one of them has a bright future ahead."



"The 'starving artist' really isn't an accurate label around here," chuckled Jeff Marley, Heritage Arts **Department Chair** at SCC. "The classes we offer help prepare anyone who enjoys creating art and wants to make a living at it."

SCC offers a wide variety of Heritage Arts classes at the Swain Center, including ceramics, digital photography, printmaking, paints, drawing, weaving and more.

The program frequently works with community partners to offer opportunities to experience the arts or assist in delivering art-based content.

"Our classes are centered around process-based learning and sharing of creative ideas," Marley said.

Anyone over 16 years of age may enroll in the classes year round, and

those under 16 may enroll during the summer semester.

> > training and knowledge they need to open and operate their own studio-based businesses in the field of ceramics. This program consists of dedicated studio coursework as well as small business courses. Marley also helps lead

a Ceramic Arts Club, which promotes appreciation of clay and the ceramic arts through workshops and field trips that enhance artistic growth and interest in the ceramics field.

"Through the shows and festivals the club participates in, we are able to help students learn how to market and sell their work," Marley said. "Together with the Heritage Arts program, we have a business incubator for artists."



Advanced Medical Life Support: NAEMT's Advanced Medical Life Support (AMLS) course is the first EMS education program that fully addresses how to best assess and manage the most common medical crises in patients, offering a "think outside the box" methodology. It is for all levels of practitioners with a strong commitment to patient care, including emergency medical technicians, paramedics, nurses, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurse anesthetists and physicians. The course emphasizes the use of scene sizeup, history, interactive group discussion on potential treatment strategies, and physical exam to systematically rule out and consider possibilities and probabilities in treating patients' medical crises. The course offers an initial assessment-based approach that progresses to a diagnostic-based approach to quickly develop the best treatment plan. SCC-PSTC TBD

Emergency Medical Responder: The primary focus of the Emergency Medical Responder is to initiate immediate lifesaving care to critical patients who access the emergency medical system. This individual possesses the basic knowledge and skills necessary to provide lifesaving interventions while awaiting additional EMS response and to assist higher level personnel at the scene and during transport. Emergency Medical Responders function as part of a comprehensive EMS response, under medical oversight. Emergency Medical Responders perform basic interventions with minimal equipment. The class consists of 72 hours didactic and hands-on patient scenario training. Call for more information. SCC-PSTC

Pediatric Critical Care: (24 hrs.) This course covers pediatric renal failure, status epilepticus in pediatrics, pediatric burn patient, pediatric stroke patient, etc. September

This offering consists of 200 hours of didactic web-based coursework and several in class practical sessions held at the Jerry Sutton Public Safety Training Center located in Franklin as well as 24 hrs. of EMS Field Internship. FIRE AND RESCUE

SCC offers a wide variety of fire and rescue training courses in cooperation with individual fire and rescue departments in Jackson, Macon, Swain Counties and the Qualla Boundary. Instructor Indoctrination (8 hrs.)- This Office of State Fire Marshal class is required of any Level II instructor who wishes to become qualified to teach in any fire/rescue subject. It is recommended for any instructor who has never taken the class as it presents vital information on what is required of you as a lead instructor.

FIP 3000: Firefighter Academy: (458 hrs.) This State accredited program is designed to prepare entry level individuals with the cognitive and physical skills to become certified firefighters. The Fire Academy, upon completion, will enable the graduate to be certified to work as a Firefighter in the State of North Carolina or any other IFSAC or Pro-Board Compliant state pending completion of the Firefighter certification test which will be administered at the conclusion of training as part of the Academy.

SCC-PSTC Spring 2019

FIP 3011: Fire Hose Stream and Appliances: (20 hrs.) This course will teach students about the many types of fire hoses available to them and the applications of each. Cowee Fire Dept. Sept. 2019

FIP 3018: Water Supplies: (20 hrs.) This class is to designed to give firefighters the knowledge needed to be successful in water operations. Class topics include water supply calculations, how to obtain different water supplies and how to provide water to an emergency scene.

SCC-PSTC Sept. 2018

FIP 3026: Mayday: (8 hrs.) This class is designed to teach firefighters how to properly and effectively call for help in the event of an incident inside of an incident. This class will also teach students to be mindful of all radio traffic. Cullasaja Fire Dept. Oct. 2018

FIP 3354: Air Monitoring & Sample: (16 hrs.) This course is designed to assist firefighters and emergency responders in hazardous material incidents.

FIP 3806: Level I Instructor: (26 hrs.) This course is required of individuals that wish to begin a career in fire/ rescue teaching. During this course students will learn the legal requirements in the classroom, how to properly present a lesson and how to interact with the class. Course requirements: Individuals must be certified for three years prior to taking this course. 8/4

LAW ENFORCEMENT

CJC 3938: Basic Law Enforcement Training (BLET) Class #78: (744 hrs.) The North Carolina Basic Law Enforcement Training is a State-accredited program designed to prepare entry level individuals with the cognitive and physical skills to become certified police officers and deputy sheriffs. The Commission-mandated course, upon completion, will enable the graduate to be certified to work as a sworn law enforcement officer in North Carolina. SCC-PSTC offers two academies a year (Summer/Fall).

CJC 3941: Detention Officer Certification Training (DOCC): (206 hrs.) The North Carolina Detention Officer Certification Course is a State accredited program designed to prepare entry level individuals with the cognitive and physical skills to become certified detention officers. SCC-PSTC TBA

CJC 3928: General Instructor Training: This course should be taken by Criminal Justice personnel planning to teach in any course mandated by either the Criminal Justice Education Training Standards Commission or the Sheriffs' Education Training Standards Commission. Prior to teaching in any commission-mandates course, you must successfully complete this course, apply for and be granted certification as a probationary instructor. Also, personnel desiring to attend specialized instructor training courses such as Firearms, Subject Control, Physical Fitness, Driver Training, etc. must first successfully complete the General Instructor Training course.

CJC 5055: National Park Service - Seasonal Law Enforcement Training (NPS-SLET) Program Session #101 (Fall 2018): The National Park Service - Seasonal Law Enforcement Training (NPS-SLET) program delivered by the Southwestern Community College - Division of Public Safety Training Center (SCC-PSTC) is approved by the United States Department of the Interior (DOI) and coordinated by the National Park Service Law Enforcement Training Center (NPS-LETC), Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC), located in Glynco, Georgia.
