REFUND POLICY

The college shall issue tuition-and-fee reimbursements only in the following circumstances:

- A 100% refund shall be given for tuition and fees if a class in which the student is officially registered is canceled by the college.
- 2. A 100% tuition refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws prior to the first day of class(es) of the academic semester as noted in the college calendar.
- 3. A 75% refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws from the class(es) prior to or on the official 10% point of the semester.
- 4. For classes beginning at times other than the first week (seven calendar days) of the semester, a 100% refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws from the class prior to the first class meeting. A 75% refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws from the class prior to or on the 10% point of the class.
- 5. A 100% refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws from a contact-hour class prior to the first day of the academic semester or term or if the college cancels the class. A 75% refund shall be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class on or before the tenth calendar day of the class.
- 6. For a class(es) which the college collects receipts which are not required to be deposited into the State Treasury account, the college's local refund policy is the same as if the collected receipts were deposited into the State Treasury account.
- 7. Where a student, having paid the required tuition and fees for a semester or term, dies during the semester (prior to or on the last day of examinations of the college the student was attending), all tuition and fees for that semester or term will be refunded to the estate of the deceased.



SCC AND MOTHER TOWN JOIN FORCES TO BENEFIT LOCAL TRIBAL MEMBERS

In recent months, Southwestern Community College's Educational Opportunities department has partnered with the Mother Town Healing Project through the Tribal Employment Rights Office (TERO) of the Qualla Boundary to provide employability skills training, career opportunities and additional support to tribal members recovering from addiction.

The Mother Town Healing Project is a TERO initiative aiming to provide recovery support, personal growth, skill-building opportunities and community to those in need. These efforts are centered around giving a second chance to tribal members recovering from addiction.

TERO partnered with SCC's Human Resources Development program to provide workforce preparation classes that include numerous activities and chances for professional development.

All 10 students in the inaugural class are Cherokee residents who eagerly participated in all aspects of the program overseen by Deborah Kennedy, adjunct instructor for Educational Opportunities at SCC and Erin Taylor of the TERO office.

Most recently, students took part in the "New Year, New Me" program, during which each received a professional makeover at SCC's Jackson Campus. Each Mother Town participant picked out some clothing from SCC's professional clothes closet, and SCC cosmetology students gave the Mother Town participants new hairstyles.

"These students mean so much to me, just to see the growth and genuine love they have for each other," Kennedy said. "The fact that we are integrating the two programs so seamlessly is incredible."

A star student within the Mother Town Healing Project has been Jake Lambert, who expressed gratefulness for an opportunity for employment. He also appreciated that the program has allowed him to get back on his feet and make a better plan for his future.

"I was in a rut with addiction the past few years, really from the time I was a teenager," said Lambert, who is 27. "Life was going nowhere, and I didn't really have any connections to get anywhere in life ... I finally decided to get into recovery and turn things around. Through recovery is where I heard about Mother Town.

"(Mother Town Instructors and organizers) have been flexible with me and let me attend the groups I go to for recovery," Lambert added. "They helped me get my driver's license back. They helped me with studying and took me to the Department of Motor Vehicles. They helped me apply for jobs outside the program. They helped with the little things that help you get back on your feet."

When asked if he could give a struggling individual advice Lambert said: "Be committed. If it is something you seriously want, be committed, set your goals and go out and achieve them."

This pilot group has seen major success. All 10 students received internship placements to gain work experience, and many are working to gain full-time positions.

SCC offers participants a no-cost employability lab, which teaches necessary skills to apply for jobs online, successfully interview and maintain employment. Similar labs are offered to the general public at locations in Jackson, Macon, Swain Counties and the Qualla Boundary.

Bianca Dardeen said Mother Town has given her "confidence, employability skills and a better understanding of how her surrounding community is loving and forgiving."

Dardeen spoke most positively, however, about the friendships she has made through the program.

SCC and the Mother Town Healing Project are opening new doors for those in need, and - through this program - the students are showing the community that anything is possible with hard work.

SCC'S **OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP PROGRAM** REACHES NEW HEIGHTS

The Outdoor Leadership program at Southwestern Community College continues to shine as an industry pioneer under the guidance of founding coordinator Paul Wolf.

More than 18 years ago, Wolf began SCC's Outdoor Leadership program with a desk propped up by four cinder blocks and a wealth of knowledge. Without any template to model after, Wolf created what is now a nationally known program, and he did it all from scratch.

Housed at the SCC Swain Center, Wolf's program includes an Outdoor Leadership Associate of Applied Science (AAS) as well as certificates in Outdoor Leadership, Wilderness Emergency Medicine, and Wilderness Therapy. Since its inception, the Outdoor Leadership program has welcomed numerous participants coming from all walks of life.

In recent months Wolf has yet again elevated the prominence of SCC's Outdoor Leadership program at the international level as he was selected to be a member of the Accreditation Council and the Standards Committee of the Association of Experiential Education (AEE). Wolf, alongside others in countries such as Canada, Hong Kong, Vietnam and Australia work to create, maintain and uphold the standards and accreditation processes set out by the AEE for Adventure Programs and Outdoor Behavioral Healthcare. This body and its members strive to ensure professional and safe standards for programs around the world. Wolf works tirelessly in his positions to improve upon procedural and safety regulations for others across the globe.

"Throughout his time at Southwestern, Paul has consistently raised the bar for our outdoor leadership program," said Dr. Thom Brooks, executive vice president for instruction and student services.

"He puts in hours that nobody will ever

We are extremely proud to have him as a member of the SCC family."

Under Wolf's creative guidance, SCC has become an industry leader in adventure programs and experiential learning. Participants in SCC's Outdoor Leadership program not only receive an incredible education, but also each become certified as Wilderness First Responders, Swift Water Rescue Technicians, and Leave No Trace Trainers. Each certification is included within the Outdoor Leadership curriculum at no extra cost to students. Wolf and SCC have also created an articulation agreement with the Parks and Recreation Management department at Western Carolina Univesity to allow Outdoor Leadership students an opportunity to advance their education.

The program continues to progress with the development and implementation of the Wilderness Therapy certificate. It was the first undergraduate credential for Wilderness Therapy in the nation, with other colleges now following Wolf's example. Although the certificate was originally created for individuals wanting to enter the industry, the program has since flourished to include a large number of pre-existing professionals. Many of them use SCC's Wilderness Therapy certificate as an integral part of their professional development. Wolf and the entire Outdoor Leadership team pride themselves on creating an experiential

> With SCC being the only college in the state to successfully design and implement an Outdoor Leadership associate degree, it is clear Wolf's approach is working. Graduates of the Outdoor Leadership program and recipients of the Wilderness Therapy certificate go on to work with various companies and organizations such as Red Oak Recovery, the School of Urban Wilderness Survival, the **Great Smoky Mountain** National Park Service, and the United States Forest Service.



Medical Lab Techs are vital to the healthcare system

"Lab techs are the centerpiece of how an ER runs efficiently. Without them, everything would grind to a halt."

Roughly 10 years ago, Ginger A. Baker was overseeing emergency room lab tests at a hospital in Washington, D.C., when she noticed some disturbing numbers on a complete blood count exam.

A female patient in her mid-20s had some unusual results in a histogram, so Baker did some quick research and realized the patient was likely experiencing a pulmonary embolism.

A CT (Computed Tomography) scan confirmed Baker's theory, and the resulting care that patient received very likely saved her life.

Baker, who graduated from Southwestern Community College's Medical Laboratory Technology program in 1996, said it's just one among many examples that show how alert and efficient lab technicians make a major difference in patient care.

"What I love about the field is that there's consistency, but you're not doing the exact same thing every day," Baker said. "You make a dramatic difference in patient care. You may not be in direct contact with the patient like a nurse, but you're having an equal impact with what you're doing behind the scenes."

Dr. Brad McAbee, medical director at Harris Regional Hospital in Sylva, agreed: "Lab techs are the centerpiece of how an ER runs efficiently. Without them, everything would grind to a halt."

That's why a recent trend is particularly troubling. Baker and Andrea Kennedy, who coordinates Southwestern's MLT program, said there's a significant shortage of lab technicians throughout the United States.

According to Baker, who's now self-employed as an operational consultant in laboratory medicine, 60 percent of the nation's MLT associate degree programs have closed down – and 70 percent of the nation's lab techs are 10 years from retirement.

"We are at critical mass," said Baker, who's performed lab testing in 48 states and now consults across the country as well as in Great Britain and Spain. "A quality program like SCC's provides students with an educational path toward an extremely stable position at virtually any organization anywhere.

"There is a very high demand nationwide," she added. "Most of the people filling those jobs right now are coming from outside the U.S. just because we don't have enough programs like SCC's in this country."

Kennedy, who's been at SCC since 1993, is eager to reverse that trend.

"I want to restore and invigorate a renewed interest in this profession," Kennedy said. "Our program offers online courses with local students performing labs on campus and distance learning students performing tests at full-service labs in their respective geographic areas. The average salary for our graduates is \$38,000 – and there is more to be earned with further education into a bachelor's or master's degree in Medical Laboratory Science or Doctorate in Clinical Laboratory Science degree."

Medical laboratory professionals provide a number of services, including quality lab test results for the diagnosis and management of disease and results to assist in health maintenance and prevention of disease - improving healthcare outcomes.

"It's actually kind of interesting that right at this point when we're more focused on healthcare than at any point in our history, we are on the precipice of a historic shortage in one of the most vital healthcare fields around today," said Mitch Fischer, dean of health sciences at SCC. "I'm convinced that if more people were aware of what Medical Laboratory Technology is all about – and if they knew what they'll get to do on a daily basis - programs like ours would need to hire more instructors and build more labs to accommodate all the students."

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THREE SCC INSTRUCTORS LISTED AS TEXTBOOK REVIEWERS

When only 50 reviewers are listed nation-wide in a textbook, it is rare for any college to have one faculty member listed. Southwestern Community College's nursing program has three.

SCC nursing instructors Kimi Walker and Wendy Buchanan, along with SCC nursing program coordinator Barbara Connell, were listed in the Pearson "Nursing: A Concept-Based Approach to Learning" textbook as reviewers of volumes 1 and 2. Buchanan recently found out she was listed again in volume 3.

"The first edition of this book was built on the North Carolina Concept-Based Nursing Model," said Buchanan. "In 2008, the associate degree nursing programs worked together to build the concept program we now use statewide."

Since that time, other nursing programs have also adopted concept-based curriculum and have increased the use of the book outside the state.

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


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
