Stanley Kingsberry is enrolled in the Automotive Systems Technology degree and is an active participant in the Student Support Services Program at SCC. Last year Stanley was having difficulty obtaining his high school transcript to enroll at SCC, so he decided to register for SCC's GED program to enable him to continue his education. Completing his GED in January 2015, Stanley started taking classes to prepare for college courses and worked with his Student Support Services advisor enroll in to the Automotive Systems Technology program. Only after Stanley had been at SCC for several months did he casually mention in a paper for an English class that he had a patent for a magnetic wrench. Over the past year

Stanley's life has been a whirlwind as he watched his invention take off, while he simultaneously achieved success in the classroom. With the continued support of his wife, and with assistance from numerous SCC faculty and staff, he made connections helping him get his patent closer to becoming an actual product. He attended trade shows in Raleigh, Fayetteville and other locations across the country, worked to have prototypes made, and has been interviewed countless times for television and newspaper articles.

Stanley possesses several attributes that help him succeed, including being focused, hardworking, and never giving up. Stanley works hard in his classes doing whatever it takes to achieve good grades. Stanley has a positive, never give up attitude that enables him to overcome obstacles. When he has encountered setbacks in class he seeks out extra help. Perhaps most important, Stanley loves to learn, which fuels his desire to continue taking courses even with his magnetic wrench patent prospects soaring.

Stanley states, "As an adult student returning to school after many years of not taking any classes, I needed support.
