

PHYSICAL THERAPIST ASSISTANT Health Sciences

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Physical Therapist Assistant curriculum prepares graduates to work in direct patient care settings under the supervision of physical therapists. Assistants work to improve or restore function by alleviation or prevention of physical impairment and perform other essential activities in a physical therapy department.

Course work includes normal human anatomy and physiology, the consequences of disease or injury, and physical therapy treatment of a variety of patient conditions affecting humans throughout the life span.

Graduates may be eligible to take the licensure examination administered by the NC Board of Physical Therapy Examiners. Employment is available in general hospitals, rehabilitation centers, extended care facilities, specialty hospitals, home health agencies, private clinics, and public school systems.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Southwestern Community College's Physical Therapist Assistant Degree Program has a two-year integrated format, meaning that students experience classroom instruction and clinical education simultaniously, and is five semesters in length.

Students who successfully complete the program graduate with an Associate's Degree in Applied Science, and are eligible to sit for the National Licensure Exam and become NC state licensed Physical Therapist Assistants.

WHY SOUTHWESTERN

- Southwestern hosts the only public, regionally accredited Physical Therapist Assisting (PTA) associate degree program in Western North Carolina.
- Students will learn from highly qualified faculty, who use up-to-date teaching methodologies and state-of-theindustry equipment in their instruction.
- Southwestern's PTA program is nationally accredited by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (APTA).
- Students experience small classes and individual attention from instructors with the acceptance of 16 students in the program each fall.
- Based on site availability, students experience a clinical rotation through each of the following types of healthcare organizations: general hospital, skilled nursing facility/home health, and a freestanding facility.

AFTER GRADUATION

Upon successful completion of this program licensed graduates will be prepared to help patients restore quality of life through rehabilitation by working under the supervision of a Licensed Physical Therapist. They will have an in-depth knowledge of anatomy, kinesiology and pathology. They will work with patients who have lost the ability to function normally from any number of reasons from birth defects, traumatic injuries, heart attacks, strokes, athletic injuries, or diseases such as arthritis and Parkinson's disease.
