REGISTRATION FEES

Registration fees are due at the time of registration. Students are not enrolled until all registration fees are paid. Registration fees, supplies fees, technology fees, insurance fees, and book fees, if required, are listed with each course listing.

ELIGIBILITY

Admission is open to adults who are at least 18 years old and who are not enrolled in public school. 16 to 18-year-olds may enroll in some courses, when space is available and pending proper permission. Students under 18 years of age may enroll in summer classes specifically for the younger student. Only individuals who have registered and paid may attend class.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT

For occupational extension classes, Continuing Education Units (CEUs) are allowed. One CEU may be given for each 10 contact hours of participation in class.

REFUND POLICY

Registration fee refunds are granted only under the following circumstances:

- A student who officially withdraws from an extension class(es) prior to the first class meeting shall be eligible for a 100 percent refund. Also, a student is eligible for a 100-percent refund if an applicable class fails to "make" due to insufficient enrollment.
- After the respective class begins a 75-percent refund shall be made upon the request of the student if the student officially withdraws from the class prior to or on the 10-percent point of the scheduled hours of the class. Note: This rule is applicable regardless of the number of times the class meets or the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet.
- A 100-percent refund shall be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class prior to the first day of class of the academic semester or term of if the college cancels the class. A 75-percent refund shall

be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class on or before the tenth calendar day of the class.

• Self-supporting classes are not eligible for refunds.

HOS-3007-Bartending: (33 hrs.) This course will assist students in becoming a professional bartender. The course will include information on making drinks, Alcoholic Beverage Control requirements, drink recipes, using proper amounts, mixes, glassware and garnishes, employment opportunities, the use of wines, glassware and drink recipes. Students completing this course should be able to identify a minimum of 35 recipes, using proper amounts, mixes, glassware and garnishes. All tools and equipment of the trade will be used. OSH 3013-OSHA 10 Hour Construction Outreach:

This course is designed for construction workers, foremen, job supervisors, and anyone involved in the construction industry. Upon successful completion, students will receive an OSHA 10-Hour Construction Outreach DOL course completion card. SEF 3001-Computed Tomography Clinical Experience: Clinical experience is an important step on the post-primary pathway to obtaining an ARRT credential. The purpose of the clinical experience requirements is to verify that candidates have completed a subset of the clinical procedures within a discipline. Successful performance of these fundamental procedures, in combination with mastery of the cognitive knowledge and skills covered by the examination, provides the basis for the acquisition of the full range of clinical skills required in a variety of settings. To successfully complete your clinical experience requirements, you must perform and document 125 exams as required by the ARRT. You'll need to complete the activities before you apply for certification and registration, and you must perform them no more than 24 months before you submit your application. Students will also be responsible for costs associated with clinical acceptance at local hospitals (Insurance, Immunizations, Uniforms, Background Check, and Drug Screening.) UAS-3111-Introduction to Drones: (24 hrs.) This course will cover information on what students should know before they buy and what they should know before they fly (regulations and laws in regard to drones and flying locations), as well as what is required to fly a drone professionally. The inevitable crashes and fly-aways will be examined, and drone repair will be explored. Emphasis will be placed on safety, and the curriculum will cover Federal Aviation Administration regulations, the NCDOT Division of Aviation UAS flight standards and best practices, preparation steps for commercial operations and potential commerce opportunities. 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Kirby raises \$2,100 for Student Emergency Fund

Running (and occasionally walking) 74 miles in one day allows a man plenty of time to think.

Matt Kirby, who serves as the Jackson County Early College Liaison, spent much of his time on the Georgia Death Race considering the bigger picture of why he was pushing his body to the brink of exhaustion on March 31.

Anytime his legs started aching or his lungs began to burn or his throat got parched, Kirby would scroll through his mind and see the faces of the Southwestern Community College students who may benefit from his efforts.

Along the way, he trimmed three hours off his time from the year before. Out of more than 280 competitors who started the race, Kirby was among the 130 who finished.

"If I had to run 74 miles by myself with no support, no aid station, nobody handing me water or encouragement, it would be miserable, and I would probably fail," Kirby said. "The fact that there are all these people out there who don't even really know you, but you're connected by this trail, and they're rooting for you, cheering you on and supporting you in all these different ways – it's a metaphor for how life is when thing get hard."

That's also an accurate metaphor for what Kirby was doing on that trail – and what he does every day in supporting JCEC students at SCC.

Kirby raised \$2,100 in donations through his participation in the Georgia Death Race, and he gave every penny to the SCC Foundation's Student Emergency Fund. The fund assists students with crisis-type emergencies that might otherwise prevent them from continuing toward their college degrees.

CJC 3938: Basic Law Enforcement Training (BLET): (744 hrs.) The North Carolina Basic Law Enforcement Training is a State-accredited program designed to prepare entry level individuals with the cognitive and physical skills to become certified police officers and deputy sheriffs. The course is comprised of 35 separate blocks of instruction. The Commission-mandated course, upon completion, will enable the graduate to be certified to work as a sworn law enforcement officer in North Carolina. SCC-PSTC offers two academies a year (Summer/Fall). SCC-PSTC 7/15-12/11

CJC 3941: Detention Officer Certification Training (DOCC): (206 hrs.) The North Carolina Detention Officer Certification Course is a State accredited program designed to prepare entry level individuals with the cognitive and physical skills to become certified detention officers. SCC AND MOTHER TOWN JOIN FORCES TO BENEFIT LOCAL TRIBAL MEMBERS

In recent months, Southwestern Community College's Educational Opportunities department has partnered with the Mother Town Healing Project through the Tribal Employment Rights Office (TERO) of the Qualla Boundary to provide employability skills training, career opportunities and additional support to tribal members recovering from addiction.

The Mother Town Healing Project is a TERO initiative aiming to provide recovery support, personal growth, skill-building opportunities and community to those in need. These efforts are centered around giving a second chance to tribal members recovering from addiction.

TERO partnered with SCC's Human Resources Development program to provide workforce preparation classes that include numerous activities and chances for professional development.

All 10 students in the inaugural class are Cherokee residents who eagerly participated in all aspects of the program overseen by Deborah Kennedy, adjunct instructor for Educational Opportunities at SCC and Erin Taylor of the TERO office.

Most recently, students took part in the "New Year, New Me" program, during which each received a professional makeover at SCC's Jackson Campus. Each Mother Town participant picked out some clothing from SCC's professional clothes closet, and SCC cosmetology students gave the Mother Town participants new hairstyles.

"These students mean so much to me, just to see the growth and genuine love they have for each other," Kennedy said. "The fact that we are integrating the two programs so seamlessly is incredible."

A star student within the Mother Town Healing Project has been Jake Lambert, who expressed gratefulness for an opportunity for employment. He also appreciated that the program has allowed him to get back on his feet and make a better plan for his future.

"I was in a rut with addiction the past few years, really from the time I was a teenager," said Lambert, who is 27. "Life was going nowhere, and I didn't really have any connections to get anywhere in life ... I finally decided to get into recovery and turn things around. Through recovery is where I heard about Mother Town. "(Mother Town Instructors and organizers) have been flexible with me and let me attend the groups I go to for recovery," Lambert added. "They helped me get my driver's license back. They helped me with studying and took me to the Department of Motor Vehicles. They helped me apply for jobs outside the program. They helped with the little things that help you get back on your feet."

When asked if he could give a struggling individual advice Lambert said: "Be committed. If it is something you seriously want, be committed, set your goals and go out and achieve them."

This pilot group has seen major success. All 10 students received internship placements to gain work experience, and many are working to gain full-time positions.

SCC offers participants a no-cost employability lab, which teaches necessary skills to apply for jobs online, successfully interview and maintain employment. Similar labs are offered to the general public at locations in Jackson, Macon, Swain Counties and the Qualla Boundary.

Bianca Dardeen said Mother Town has given her "confidence, employability skills and a better understanding of how her surrounding community is loving and forgiving."

Dardeen spoke most positively, however, about the friendships she has made through the program.

SCC and the Mother Town Healing Project are opening new doors for those in need, and - through this program - the students are showing the community that anything is possible with hard work.
