SCHEDULE ADJUSTMENT

Students meet with their assigned advisors to adjust class schedules. Tuition for ANY classes added must be PAID by the close of business on the day added.

Spring 2018 Schedule Adjustment Periods

First Session – January 8-9 Full Session – January 8-12

REFUND POLICY

The college shall issue tuition and fee reimbursements only in the following circumstances:

- A 100% refund shall be given for tuition and fees if a class in which the student is officially registered is canceled by the College.
- 2. A 100% tuition refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws prior to the first day of class(es) of the academic semester as noted in the College calendar.
- 3. A 75% refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws from the class(es) prior to or on the official 10% point of the semester.
- 4. For classes beginning at times other than the first week (seven calendar days) of the semester a 100% refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws from the class prior to the first class meeting. A 75% refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws from the class prior to or on the 10% point of the class.
- 5. A 100% refund shall be given if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class prior to the first day of the academic semester or term or if the college cancels the class. A 75% refund shall be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class on or before the tenth calendar day of the class.
- 6. For a class(es) which the College collects receipts which are not required to be deposited into the State Treasury account, the College's local refund policy is the same as if the collected receipts were deposited into the State Treasury account.
- 7. Where a student, having paid the required tuition and fees for a semester or term, dies during the semester (prior to or on the last day of examinations of the college the student was attending), all tuition and fees for that semester or term will be refunded to the estate of the deceased.

SCC completes the March to a Million

Southwestern Community College's annual Bluegrass, Blue Jeans & Bling gala is always a celebration of students and scholarships.

This year, it mixed in a little history.

Before the night was over on Sept. 16. streamers soared over the crowd of college supporters who'd gathered to help push the SCC Foundation across the finish line in its "March

to a Million" effort.

Dr. Don Tomas, president of SCC, announced around 9:15 p.m. that silent auction sales had pushed the Student Success Campaian total over the \$1 million mark, giving the college its first seven-figure endowment to be used primarily for scholarships.

"This truly has been a community effort." Dr. Tomas said. "Rather than just having a handful of large donations, we've literally had hundreds of different individuals, organizations and businesses step forward to support this campaign. These donors believe in SCC, and - most importantly - they believe in our students"

Launched in 2013 with the help of a U.S. Department of Education challenge grant, the Student Success Campaign aims to bridge the gap between scholarship need and availability at SCC.

"Before the Student Success Campaian, SCC's largest single endowment was \$338,641 - a figure that's actually quite impressive for a school Southwestern's size," said Charles Wolfe, chairman of the Student Success Campaign. "Thanks to so many

> wonderful people in our community, we've taken scholarship support to a whole new level."

Back in 2012, the SCC Foundation only had enough resources to award scholarships to 32 students who aualified.

> This year, the number of scholarship recipients increased to 69

> "Now that we've reached the million-dollar goal, we'll be able to help more students than ever before thanks to the many generous donors who supported the Student Success Campaign," said Brett Woods, director of the SCC Foundation.

"Over the past few years of working at SCC, I've gotten to know a lot of our students. These are hardworking people with big dreams, and it is a privilege to be able to give them the

boost they need."

Final figures are still being tabulated, but SCC officials are confident this year's gala will eclipse the \$63,000 raised at last year's event.






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Nation's only Community College to Land Scientific Partnership with NASA

A total solar eclipse blankets southwestern North Carolina in darkness just once every few centuries or so. Southwestern Community College's relationship with NASA is pretty unusual too.

No other community college in the nation currently boasts a scientific partnership with NASA (National Aeronautics and Space Administration), which provided SCC and its community partners with more than \$1.5 million in grant funding to promote STEM education in the college's service area.

Lynda Parlett, Southwestern's executive director of institutional development, prepared an ultimately successful grant application in 2015 on behalf of the Smoky Mountain STEM Collaborative: the Jackson, Macon, Swain County and Cherokee Central school systems; Appalachian State University; Great Smoky Mountains National Park; NASA Marshall Space Center; and Pisgah Astronomical Research Institute.

"We're excited to have the opportunity to become part of the NASA family and to be the only community college in the nation to have a cooperative agreement with NASA. We look forward to working with our other partners throughout our region," said Dr. Don

of SCC. "The impact on our

community will be felt for

partners throughout Tomas, president students and our years to come."

In particular, the NASA partnership almost immediately influenced the life of Jesse Moore – a Macon County resident who'd been working as an electrician before enrolling at Southwestern.

He's now planning to be a rocket scientist

after serving as the team leader on SCC's high-altitude balloon project that captured images of the eclipse from approximately 80,000 feet above the earth's surface. He graduated from SCC with an associate degree in electronics engineering technology in May and is pursuing his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering at Western Carolina University.

"When I first decided to quit my job and enroll at SCC, little did I know that the experiences I'd have here – and the doors those would open for me – would actually provide me the chance to work for NASA," said Moore, a Franklin resident and father of five. "And that, coincidentally, is the goal I have set out to achieve."

While eclipse planning was only one component of SCC's partnership with NASA, the event drew quite a crowd to the area and generated momentum that Southwestern is hoping to capitalize on in the months and years ahead.

"It really is an once-in- a-lifetime opportunity for our region," Parlett said. "Working with NASA has truly been a thrill and a privilege. No other community college in the nation has access to the resources at our disposal thanks to this cooperative agreement. Our students are gaining experiences and skills that would never have been possible without NASA's involvement." Several faculty members also found themselves flooded with new opportunities. Two short years back, Matt Cass had his hands full as the science department chair at Southwestern Community College.

In the months leading up to the eclipse, his evenings and weekends were booked with speaking engagements as he helped educate the public about the once-in-a-generation phenomenon that covered SCC's service area in daytime darkness on Aug. 21.

"Since we entered into this cooperative agreement with NASA, the biggest change for me is that it's really opened the door for our students to do research,"

Cass said.

"We've had the opportunity to take students to Appalachian State University as well as to Montana and NASA's Marshall Space Center.

"Due to resource limitations in the past, our focus had not always been on research," Cass said. "But now we have an opportunity to do research in a big way."

Cass also worked with colleague Patsy Allen to organize and host STEM Camps

for middle school students the past two summers. Additionally, SCC hosted several eclipse-related special events, such as a "How to Photograph the Solar Eclipse" seminar in July and a forum featuring eclipse experts the night before the eclipse.

Additionally, region-wide eclipse planning meetings were held regularly at SCC beginning 14 months prior to the eclipse. Strategies for accommodating the influx of visitors – and all the public-safety concerns that go along with such a large-scale event – were discussed in these meetings.

"As an old astronomy geek who conducted planetarium programs in a prior life, my sights had been set on the eclipse ever since I learned that the park lay in the path of totality, several years ago," said Clay Jordan, deputy superintendent of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. "I knew then that we were going to do something big for it, but it wasn't until the Smoky Mountain STEM collaborative was formed under SCC's leadership that we had begun to brainstorm how.

"What took place (Aug. 21) far exceeded my original vision and—even after our plan was developed—my expectations," Jordan added.
"Needless to say, we couldn't have done this without the tremendous partnership that formed with about

14 organizations plus a handful of commercial vendors, performers, and individual speakers. From my perspective, the professionalism, creativity, and teamwork exhibited from all of the organizations was amazing."

Among the NASA-funded projects SCC students have been working on are a functioning Tesla coil and a high-altitude balloon that was launched on the day of the eclipse to capture video and still photos.

Southwestern was one of only a couple of community colleges involved in the balloon project.

The impact on students is immeasurable.

Southwestern, which has been ranked among the Top 10 community colleges in the nation three times in the past decade, serves Jackson, Macon, Swain Counties and the Qualla Boundary.

Last year I was just an electrician," Moore said. "Thanks to SCC and financial support from the SCC Foundation, now I am kinda like a rocket scientist. How many community colleges could have helped make that happen?"

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
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
